THE ANNUAL STUDENT SCIENTIFIC CONFERENCE IN FOREIGN LANGUAGES – 2009

The annual student scientific conference in foreign languages was traditionally held on 26 November at Novosibirsk State Technical University, Faculty of Humanities, the Department of Foreign Languages. The theme of the conference – 2009 was: “Education and Culture as Key Factors of National Development”.

Clearly, a constant improvement and enhancement of the national educational system – is a precondition for successful development of any state. It is impossible to be an economically and politically stable country without well-educated people. Moreover, in the conditions of transit to post-industrial society and economy based on information technologies and knowledge, education becomes a significant resource of socio-economic and political development and one of the leading sectors of Russian economy.

In order to avoid serious failures, the government should realize that all its activities should be carried out after serious consideration of distinctive features of national culture. When implementing policies, taking cultural and historical traditions into account is a must.

The range of the problems which were addressed at the conference was very wide indeed. The students focused on various problems modern society is faced with – political, economic, social and cultural issues. The most popular topics were the interdependence of the level of education and culture and the level of national development, advantages and disadvantages of Russian and foreign educational systems, the problems of ethnic and other minorities etc.

The program of the conference included four parallel section meetings: English (2), French and German. More than 40 students participated in the conference. The



most active ones were the representatives of International Relations and Regional Studies (East and West), Public Relations, Socio-Cultural Service and Tourism, Philology and Foreign Languages Departments.

Each participant was allowed five minutes for the PowerPoint presentation of their research work. A presentation was followed by the question and answer session. Almost all presentations provided the ground for interesting and fruitful discussion. It should be stressed that the primary purpose of the event was not only to discuss the most pressing problems but also to offer the ways of solving them.

Finally, the best students were awarded with certificates and, additionally, they received presents from the sponsors – representatives of Macmillan Publisher's House and Oxford University Press in Novosibirsk.

We are deeply grateful to all participants and our sponsors for their valuable contribution to the conference.

I studied at MGLU (Moscow State Linguistic University) at the Advanced Training Faculty during 4 months (February-June, 2009).

MGLU is a state institution, so the tuition was free. It was a refreshment course for the teach-

ers of foreign languages. There were two groups (the teachers of German language and the teachers of English language).

We had outstanding, enthusiastic, very experienced teachers, the most of them are Doctors of Science.

All classes were held in Ostozhenka St. 38. This location was very convenient: just a 5-minute walk from the Garden Ring (Metro "Park Kultury"). We lived in the one of the institute's hostel foreign students (near Ostozhenka St.).

We studied various aspects of the English language: phonetics, grammar, lexicology, stylistics, translation practice, etc.
